From Library Journal The newest addition to this series occupies a middle ground between general seashore books such as Philip Kopper's *The Wild Edge* (LJ 10/1/79) and Norman A. Meinkoth's *The Audubon Society Field Guide to North American Seashore Creatures* (LJ 2/15/82). Although it would not replace a good field guide for identification, it is much more readable than a field guide and includes interesting case histories. It also more systematically covers shore organisms, including all the major groups and some that are frequently overlooked, such as the reptiles and microorganisms in the coast's natural areas: the barrier islands, estuaries, salt marshes, and eel grass areas.
