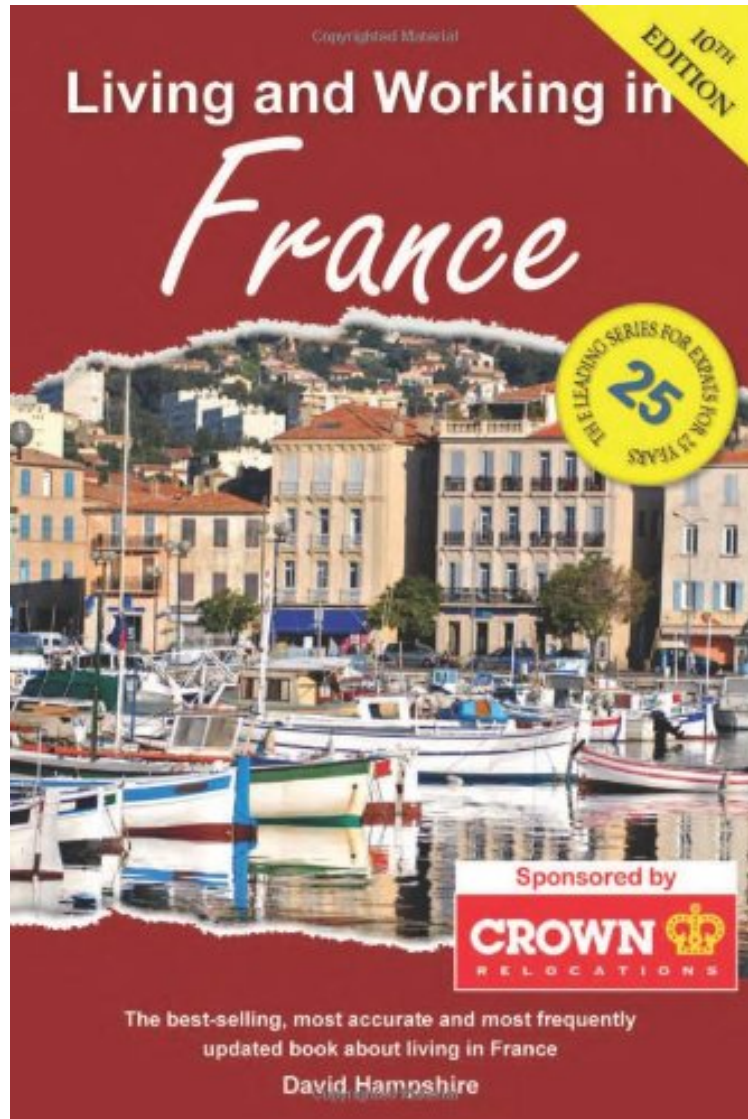

The book just gives a very broad overview on visas eg doesn't give information on spouses or children of EU nationals etc. This information is better on the internet.
