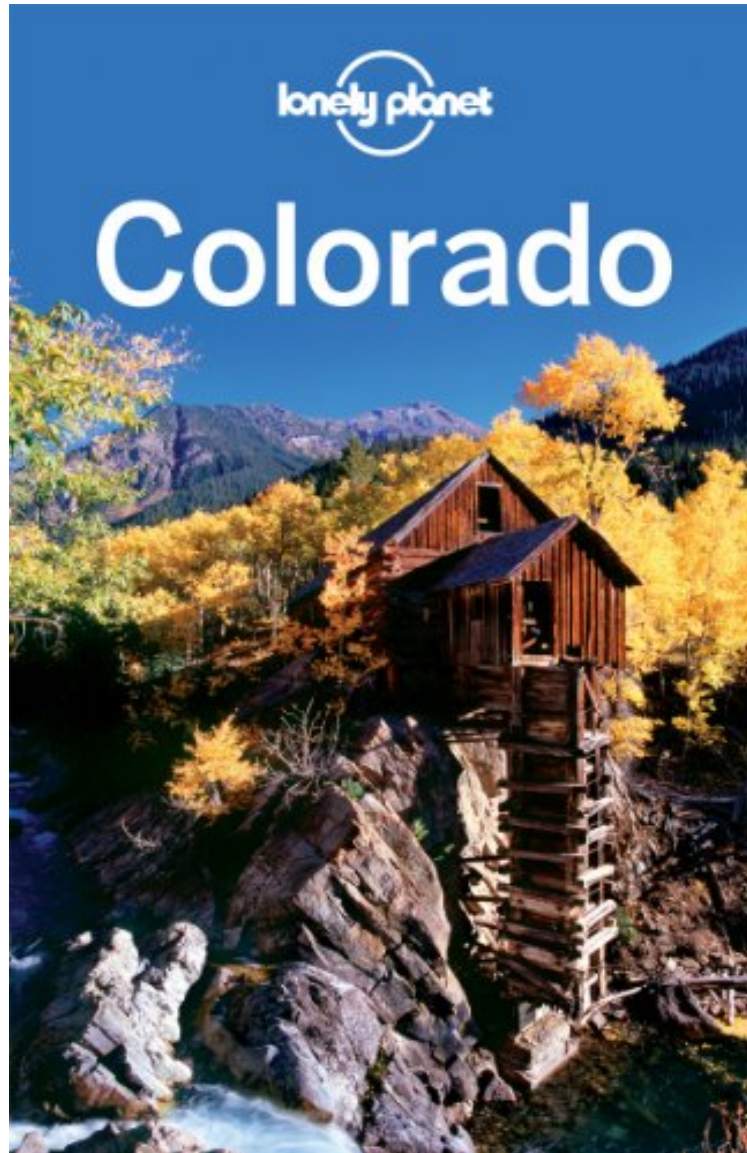

Significant sights are omitted or barely mentioned, the lodging and restaurants included miss

some of the most interesting, good quality options in many locations, and the maps are not very detailed. Very surprisingly, given how many parts of Colorado are high altitude, there is no mention of what to expect or how to cope with reactions to altitude, although there are the usual warnings about wildlife. The auto club tour guide to Colorado and Utah was far more useful and led us to more off-the-beaten-path discoveries (it's also free if you are a AAA member). The city/town guides are pretty lame as well - many obviously cool or interesting places are omitted. There are many errors throughout the book that show ignorance on the part of the writer(s) -- a Uruguayan restaurant is not Mexican (p305), it's Sangre de CRISTO Mountains not CHRISTO (p 307 and again p 308), yerba mate is not ian (p 303) ... you get the idea.
