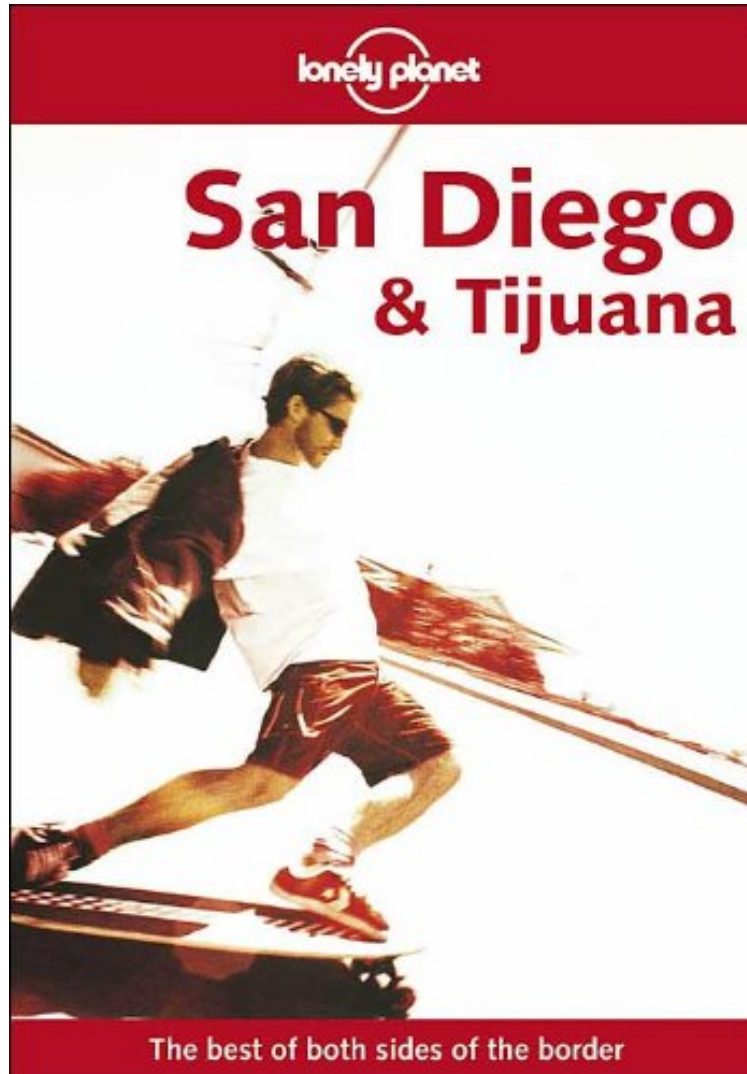

Most people and guides focus on the Ave Revolution tourist trap aspect of Tijuana and miss a unique and vibrant city, unlike any other in Mexico. Tijuana is also an excellent gateway to the rest of Mexico. You can get comfortable communicating in Spanish with its largely bilingual residents before catching an inexpensive flight or bus to destinations on the Pacific

coast or Central Mexico. I've field-tested a number of hotel, restaurant and activity recommendations and found them all excellent. Some entries are a surprise even to old TJ hands. Yes, Lonely Planet guides do have the gap-year, backpacker / budget traveler outlook (true to their roots), but it works.
