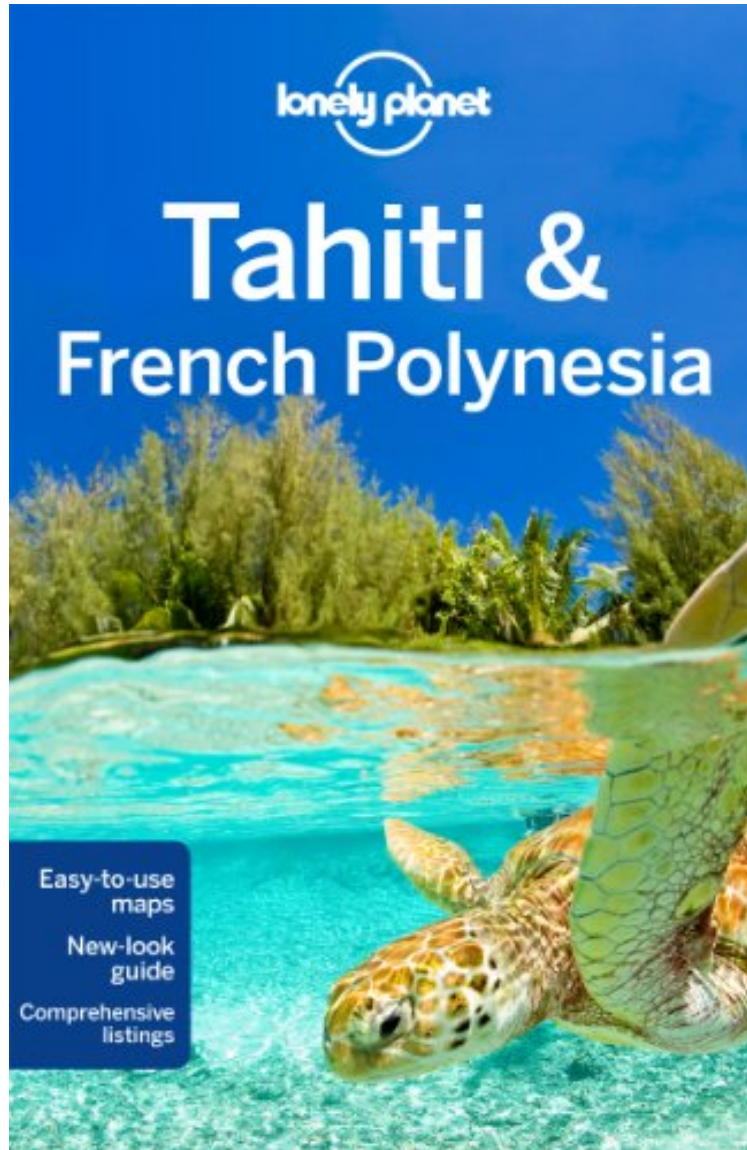

There are no color photos included or color to their maps. I'm visual so I prefer having color, glossy photos, maps, and other pages. I looked at other French Polynesia travel books and I did think this one was the most up-to-date and informative version.

Older edition (2012), whereas I was going to Tahiti in July 2016, so not sure if logistical information was accurate, turns out some was, some was not. Guide was more like a travel brochure/visitor guide from a tourist center. Hike were listed, but book recommends hiring a guide, rather than explain the hike itself. Not (enough) much detail on how to get around the islands, etc. We had to figure it out even though we had the guide. Most other guides had enough information about our destination that we could plan our day, this one did not.
