came directly from the Newburgh Petition. That document, endorsed by Gen. George Washington, asked Congress to grant lands to officers and soldiers who served in the Continental Army. I knew of the petition, but I never realized the connection between it and the Ohio Company of Associates that settled Marietta, Ohio.
