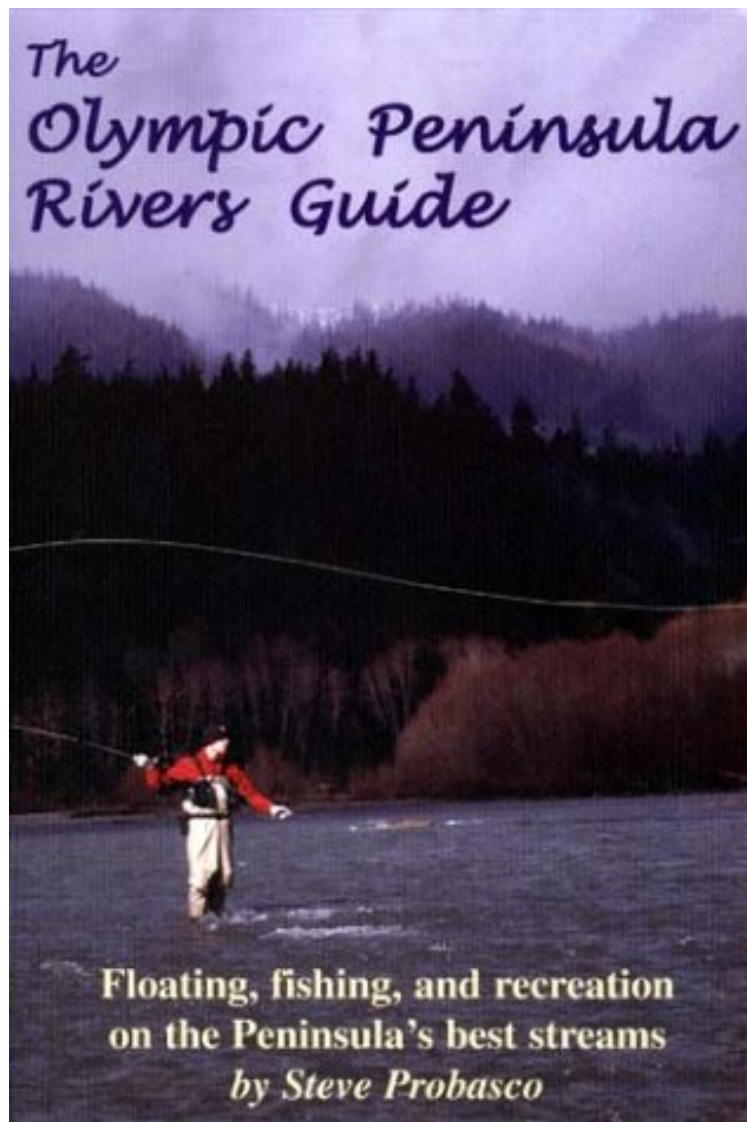

Margulis Let me begin by saying that Steve Probasco has written and published some excellent NW fishing articles, books and magazines...and that's why this book is such a disappointment. The amount of valuable information it contains is marginal and may be a reflection of the pre-internet times it was written. Save your money and search the web--you'll find a lot more information for free. The sad part is that Steve has an encyclopedic knowledge of the Olympic Peninsula and its wonderful anadromous fishery. He could have put out a killer book: this is not it.
