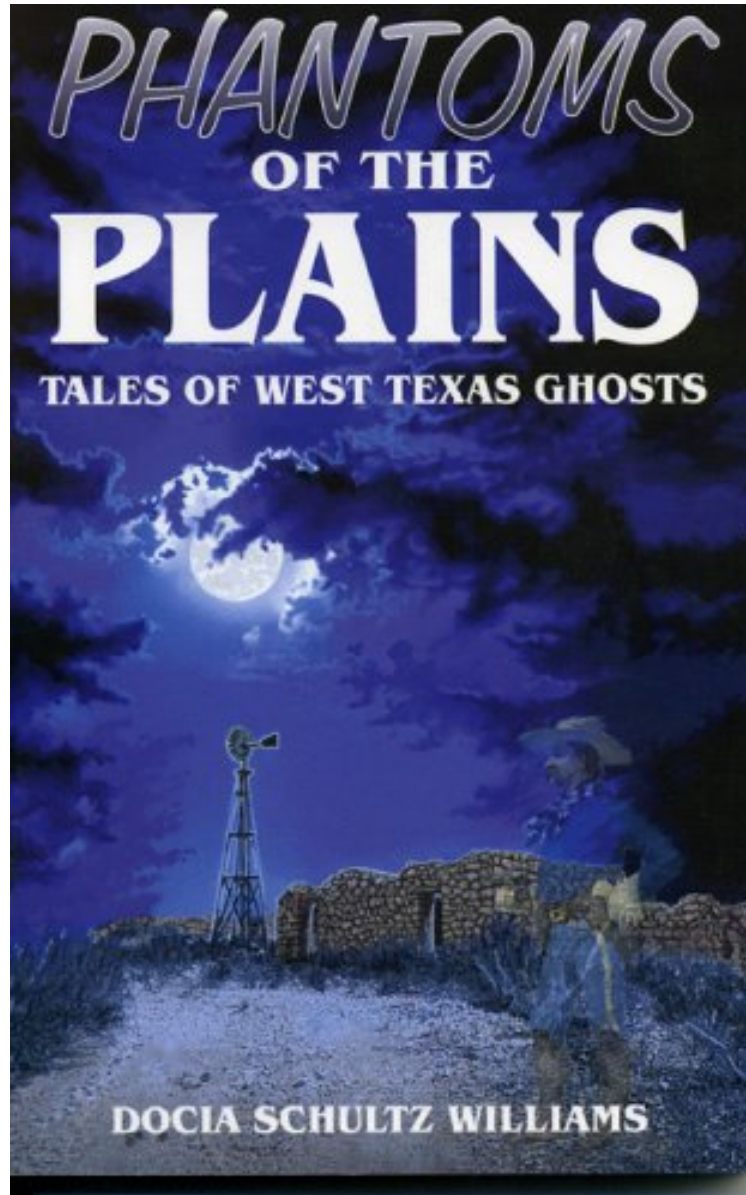

Docia Schultz Williams certainly did a lot of research both with first hand interviews and with reading old newspaper stories and records to bring to this book the hauntings of old forts, hotels, ranches, and trails of West Texas. From Abilene to San Angelo, Fort Worth to Fort Davis, Ms Williams gives stories about ghosts and the buildings they inhabit. She begins each story with a bit of history about the buildings and towns that the ghosts inhabit. They are very interesting to read. Most of the hotels are over 100 years old, and many of the forts date back from the 1840's to the 1880's. The stories are mixed with those who were killed by jealous lovers, Indians, by accident, also those who enjoyed the buildings so much when they were alive, they decided to stay after they died. Ms Williams also gives great advertising to the buildings that are still in use such as renovated hotels, restaurants, and forts which are now enjoyed by the public. There is a wide variety of stories about the places that are haunted. She begins the book telling about haunted forts and their history. Most of the ghosts of the forts are those who were in the cavalry. Some died by the elements, diseases, and some by Indians, and some by their fellow soldiers. Then the following chapters are about hotels that are haunted, restaurants that are haunted, office buildings that are haunted. You get the gist. Some of the ghosts died by jealous lovers, one elevator doorman was cut in half by the vengeful racketeers, others enjoyed staying in the hotels when they were alive, they decided to stick around after they died. All in all this is a fun and interesting read.
